Summary

Snow School Supervisors maintain the duties of Instructors (when teaching lessons) and Trainers (when training instructors) but have a primary focus on organizing and supporting students and instructors on the snow. They ensure the smooth operation of all Snow School activities and maintain a professional and positive working environment.

Job Duties

- **Organization & Coordination:** Ensure students and instructors are in the correct locations at the right times to maintain lesson schedules.
- **Operational Support:** Oversee all outside Snow School activities, ensuring smooth operation.
- **Patrol & Support:** Once lessons commence, patrol between lessons to support instructors and identify training opportunities.
- Administrative Duties: Complete all required forms for training, lesson attendance, shift attendance, and incident reports promptly.
- **Professional Environment:** Promote and maintain a healthy, positive, and professional working environment both on and off snow.

Requirements

- Availability: Full-time availability is required.
- Certifications: Minimum CSIA/CASI Level 1 certification, preferably Level 2 or higher.
- **Experience**: Experience in training instructors is essential; leadership experience is an asset.
- Strong organizational skills.
- Effective communication and interpersonal skills.
- Ability to work in a fast-paced, dynamic environment.
- Available to work from November to end of March
- Be able to work between the hours of 8:30 AM and 9:00 PM, including weekdays, weekends, and holidays.
- Must have own reliable transportation to Rabbit Hill.
- Must have own equipment.
- Must be at least 18 years of age

Working Conditions

- Physically demanding job
- Standing, riding, and walking for most of the shift
- · Working in adverse weather conditions for most of the shift
- Reaching, kneeling, bending, twisting, pulling, pushing, and lifting
- Working in a loud and fast-paced environment
- Working in high-traffic areas with potential for collisions with skiers and snowboarders
- Working on variable terrain that could be snowy, hard, icy, or wet
